Anglo-Saxon (or Old English) literature refers to literature written in Anglo-Saxon (Old English) during the 600-year Anglo-Saxon period of Britain, from the mid-5th century AD to the Norman Conquest of 1066. These works include genres such as epic poetry, hagiography, sermons, Bible translations, legal works, chronicles, riddles, and others. Anglo-Saxon literature was divided according to various criteria. One of the generally accepted classification divides it into Old English Pagan Poetry (449- 670 AD); Old English Christian Poetry (671-871 AD); Old English Prose (871- 1100 AD) (Gavrilu: 2000, p. 6). It became the capital of Wessex, one of the seven Saxon kingdoms of England, and King Alfred's elder brothers King Ethelbert and King Ethelbald were buried in its abbey.
