Action Any event or series of events depicted in a literary work; an event may be verbal as well as physical, so that speaking or telling a story within the story may be an event. Allusion A brief, often implicit and indirect reference within a literary text to something outside the text, whether another text (e.g. the Bible, a myth, another literary work, a painting, or a piece of music) or any imaginary or historical person, place, or thing. Verbal irony refers to the use of vocabulary to describe something in a way that is other than it seems. Some examples of verbal irony help to explain the concept. Verbal irony is an excellent tool of the writing trade. It allows readers to exercise a little bit of perception and omniscience. This type of irony occurs when a speaker says one thing but means another. In other words, the issues under consideration propose analytic elements and findings possibly appealing to anyone with an interest in the topic(s) of space and time, their interrelation as well as their universality, ontological status, metaphorical potential and so on. The second section of this volume "Space and Time in Literature" brings together four essays dealing with literary topics. These papers aim at demonstrating that space and time capture the imagination like no other scientific subject. Inherent in each narrative are both temporal and spatial implications; if a literary text is s
